


Noni the Pony Rescues a Joey

Field and context

Building field knowledge

• The book is quintessentially Australian, featuring native animals and language unique to Australia. What is a native animal? Brainstorm a list of animals with the class, then work together to categorise as 'Native' and 'Not Native'. Do they come up with any of the native animals featured in the book — wallaby, koala, wombat, platypus, emu, echidna, possum, goanna and quoll? ACSSU211 ST1-4LW-S

Exploring the context of the text

- The book is set in the hills around Waratah Bay, Victoria. Have a look at some photos of the area on the
 <u>Travel Victoria</u> website. Have any of your students been there, or does it remind them of any places
 they've been? What are some of the landscape features? <u>ACELT1589 EN1-4A</u>
- Read Noni the Pony and Noni the Pony Goes to the Beach, the other books in the series. This could be
 extended to do an author study of Alison Lester's books, all of which are highly engaging and relevant to
 Foundation-Year 2 students. The Reading Rockets Author Study Toolkit has some excellent ideas and
 teaching points for doing an author study in junior classrooms. ACELT1581 EN1-11D
- Watch a wildlife rescuer looking after an orphaned baby wallaby in <u>Caring for a Baby Wallaby</u> (caution: some children may find this upsetting as its mother was killed by a car not shown). This <u>National Geographic video</u> shows a baby wallaby climbing into its mother's pouch. <u>ACSHE034 ST1-10ES-S</u>

Responding and exploring

Responding to the text

• Have you ever been lost, such as at a shopping centre or at the park? What happened? What did you do? Compare students' experiences to the joey's, who was chasing a gum leaf and lost his family. Use this opportunity to talk to the students about what to do if they ever get lost. <u>ACELT1582 EN1-11D</u>

Exploring plot character and setting

Noni is described at the beginning of the story as 'friendly and frisky and loves running free'. Do you
think this is true? What other words would you use to describe her after reading the story? What are
some adjectives to describe the other animals in the book? <u>ACELA1452 EN1-9B ENe-9B</u>

Creating texts

- Recreate the story as a short play. You could add or change characters and create situations and lines for them as Noni and her friends look for the wallaby mob. <u>ACELT1586 EN1-10C</u>
- Help students develop empathy and to understand the characters by <u>'hot seating'</u>. Students take on the
 role of one of the characters in the story and their classmates as them questions, which they answer in
 character. ACELT1586 EN1-10C.
- In the same manner as the Hairy Maclary series, where each character has a short rhyme (Hairy Maclary
 from Donaldson's Dairy, Hercules Morse as big as a horse, and so on) have students create a short
 rhyming couplet for each character, such as 'The Ladies next door, the friendliest four'. Write their
 names and do an illustration. <u>ACELT1585 EN1-6B</u>
- Write a letter from the joey's family to Noni, Dave and Coco, thanking them for looking after their joey.

- Read the blurb, and explain its purpose. Does it give away the whole story? Have a go at writing your
 own version as a piece of shared writing. <u>ACELT1586 EN1-10C</u>

Examining

Examining text structure and organisation

- The story takes place over the course of a day, but some animals are sleeping why would that be?
 ACELY1660 EN1-4A
- Examine the double page spread of them finding the wallaby family. What time of day is it? How do you
 know? How do the words and pictures work together here? Have a look at the following pages as
 twilight fades to the dark. How else do we know it's night time? ACELY1670 EN1-4A

Examining grammar

- The text is written in rhyming couplets. Read each couplet, leaving the last word out. See if students
 can predict the word. Enlarge the text and cover the last word, and do the same activity but as a shared
 reading. Play Words and Pictures Rhyme Time. ACELA1439 ENe-4A
- Noni tells the joey that 'Your wallaby mob can't be too far away.' What is a 'mob'? ACELA1454 EN1-6B
- Go on a hunt for capital letters and full stops in the text. Play <u>The Sentence: Capital Letters and Full Stops</u> to practise. Did you find any question and exclamation marks in the text? What other punctuation did you find? Make an anchor chart for your classroom. <u>ACELY1672 EN1-2A EN1-9Bp></u>

Examining visual and multimodal features

- Examine the picture of the koalas sleeping in the tree. How does it give the impression of height? Have
 a look at some of the photos from this <u>photography competition</u> in which all the photos had to be taken
 from above. Have a go at drawing pictures from a bird's eye view. <u>ACELY1661_EN1-2A</u>
- Coco the cat doesn't seem quite as patient as Noni and Dave the dog when the joey gets upset. How does the illustration help us to understand this? For students with cats, can they relate to this? Are cats generally more independent than dogs? ACELT1582 EN1-11D.
- Examine the picture of the baby joey chasing the leaf. How does it give the impression of movement?
 Does it look like the joey is having fun? Why? <u>ACELY1661_EN1-2A</u>
